## JIM AGAPITO

WINNIPEG



Jim Agapito is a Filipino writer, producer, director from Winnipeg. He has worked in Canadian film and television for both broadcasters and independent productions for the past five years producing documentaries, short films, music videos and DVDs.

## SHIRA AVNI

MONTRÉAL



Filmmaker Shira Avni has been creating animated shorts with the NFB since 1997 and is currently an Assistant Professor of Film Animation at the Mel Hoppenheim School of Cinema. Avni's

films address questions of disability, sexuality, bereavement, and social justice in ways that gently break down the viewer's habitual barriers. Avni's films *Tying Your Own Shoes*, *John and Michael* and *From Far Away* have garnered over 30 grants and awards and have screened in over 100 festivals worldwide. She is currently in production on the film *Petra's Poem*, a 3D stereoscopic collaborative animation/live action hybrid experimental piece with Petra Tolley, an artist who has Down's syndrome, and performed by a dozen performers who have Down's syndrome and other special needs.

## ADAM BHALA LOUGH

NEW YORK



Adam Bhala Lough is a writer and director of feature film, documentary and short form media. His latest documentary, *The Upsetter: The Life & Music of Lee Scratch Perry*, narrated

by Academy Award winner Benicio Del Toro, has screened across the globe and is now also available on iTunes and in a limited edition DVD. Bhala Lough's career began at the age of 15 when he earned \$4.25 an hour re-stocking video tapes at a Virginia Blockbuster Video store. Inspired by the early 90's American independent film scene as much as by big Hollywood films, he borrowed a Panasonic VHS camcorder and shot numerous short films with friends, editing them tape-to-tape at a local public access station. Eventually, Bhala Lough landed at NYU to formally study filmmaking. Among his music documentary credits include not only *The Upsetter*, but also *The Carter*, an intimate look at rap superstar Lil' Wayne at a pinnacle in his career. Bhala Lough's work is inspired by the universal power of stories, moving images and music.

## CLAUDE FOURNIER

MONTRÉAL



Claude Fournier began his film career at the NFB in 1956, working on several early direct cinema films including *La Lutte*, which included Michel Brault, Claude Jutra, and Fernand

Dansereau as co-directors. He left to work in the U.S. with Richard Leacock and D.A. Pennebaker, returning to Montréal in 1963 to direct, produce and photograph hundreds of films for television and the screen. He directed Québec's most commercially successful feature and an adaptation of Gabrielle Roy's classic Québec novel *Bonheur d'occasion* [*The Tin Flute*]. He is currently at work with Marie-Josée Raymond on *Elephant*, a project to digitize and restore all of Québec feature films.

## NATHALIE GRESSIN

MONTRÉAL



Nathalie Gressin is co-producer and co-writer of many films with partner Arthur Lamothe including *Les pêcheurs Acadiens de l'île Lamèque*. Now the director of Les Ateliers Audiovisuels du

Québec, co-founded with Lamothe, Gressin assisted in curating two collections of documentaries by Lamothe about Québec's Aboriginal history and people for the Bibliothèque et Archives du Québec.

## ARTHUR LAMOTHE

MONTRÉAL



In over 40 years working in film, Arthur has directed, produced, written and edited countless documentaries and several fiction works. Born in France he came to Canada in 1953 and joined the

NFB in 1962. While at the NFB Lamothe established his vision of cinema as a tool for social commentary and activism. Lamothe started his own production company, Société générale cinématographique. In 1970, he and his wife, Nathalie Gressin, co-founded Les Ateliers Audiovisuels du Québec, where he proceeded to make most of his films. In 1980, he received the Prix Albert-Tessier, and in 1996, he received the Chevalier des arts et des lettres from France and was made a member of the Order of Canada.

## MONICA LOWE

WINNIPEG



Monica Lowe has been the distributor at the Winnipeg Film Group since July 2006. During this time she has attended over 30 film festivals and conferences around the world and seen

thousands of short films. Prior to working at the WFG, Monica spent time slinging popcorn at the drive-in, teaching English in Japan, and working in the props department on a variety of films. She holds a Fine Arts Honours degree from the University of Manitoba.

## JAMIL MAHMOOD

WINNIPEG



Jamil Mahmood is the Executive Director of the Spence Neighbourhood Association, where he has worked for the past six years. SNA is now a major leader in the youth serving sector,

where the community and youth themselves have a hand in shaping programming. Mahmood holds a BA hon. from the University of Winnipeg in International Development Studies. Prior to his tenure with the SNA, Mahmood was active with Food Not Bombs and undertook community development work in both Pakistan and Ecuador.

## ALBERT MAYSLES

NEW YORK



Two of America's foremost non-fiction filmmakers, Albert Maysles and his brother David (1932-1987) are recognized as pioneers of Cinema Direct the distinctly American version of French

Cinema Verité. They earned their distinguished reputations by being the first to make non-fiction feature films – films in which the drama of human life unfolds as is, without scripts, sets, or narration. Among their works include *Salesman* (1968), *Gimme Shelter* (1970) and *Grey Gardens* (1976). Maysles received his B.A. at Syracuse and his M.A. at Boston University, where he taught Psychology for three years. He made the transition to film in 1955 by taking a 16mm camera to Russia to film patients at several mental hospitals. The result was *Psychiatry in Russia*. Several years later, the Maysles brothers made a motorcycle journey from Munich to Moscow and along the way shot their first collaborative film on the Polish student revolution.

## CAROLINE MONNET

WINNIPEG



Caroline Monnet (Algonquin/French), born in Ottawa, Canada, is a self-taught award winning filmmaker and artist. She completed a B.A in Communication and Sociology

at the University of Ottawa and Granada, Spain. She uses video, photography, and installation to explore the dualities of her social, political, and spiritual identity, developing a critical framework influenced by history, community, and unconventional memory. Monnet's work has been exhibited across Europe, Canada and the US. She is currently based in Winnipeg where she is an active member of ITWÉ, a trans-disciplinary collective dedicated to research, creation, production and education in the field of Aboriginal digital culture.

## CAROLE O'BRIEN

WINNIPEG



Carole has worked as a filmmaker on the dramatic form – making six short films in 10 years. 2003 marked an experimental turn in her practice, and in five years, made three film poems, using

found footage, hand-processing techniques and a more painterly approach. She is currently completing a Master's degree in City Planning and is eager to see where her future film/city praxis will lead her.

## STÉPHANE OYSTRYK

WINNIPEG



Stéphane studied film at the University of Manitoba and has since worked as a director in television. His short films often deal with St. Boniface, his neighbourhood. He is

currently working on a rockumentary that focuses on Winnipeg's Mahogany Frog and a script for *FM YOUTH*, a feature length film based on one of his previous shorts about francophone youths who live in St. Boniface.

## DOMINIQUE REY

WINNIPEG



Dominique Rey works in a number of media; she is a painter; a photographer; a video artist; and a performance artist. Her work has been reviewed in the *Globe & Mail*, *Border*

*Crossings*, *Frieze*, *Canadian Art*, and the *Winnipeg Free Press*. Prior to her MFA in New Media from the *Transart Institute*, she obtained an MFA in photography from *Bard College* in 2007. Dominique Rey was named *Winnipeg's Visual Arts Ambassador* for the 2010 Cultural Capital of Canada and she was a long list nominee for the 2011 *Sobey Art Award*.

## DANIELLE STURK

WINNIPEG



A multi-disciplinary artist, Danielle Sturk graduated in film studies from the University of Winnipeg. She began her career as a dance artist and choreographer, performing in

Winnipeg, Vancouver, New York and Montreal from 1986-1997. Her latest film, *ciel(s)*, a dance hybrid documentary about the afterlife, was awarded the audience award *Gerbe d'or* at *Cinéma* in 2010.

## LAURENCE VÉRON

WINNIPEG



Born in Paris, France, she started her career in Saint-Boniface with *Les Productions Rivard* in 1999. Her documentary on Franco-Manitoban literature, *Le Blé Et La Plume*, received

two 2001 *Blizzard* awards for best non-dramatic directing and for best cinematography. Laurence has studied dramatic writing and directing at the *Institut national de l'image et du son* in Montreal, and at the *Women in the Director's Chair Workshop* at the *Banff Center* under internationally-recognized Canadian director *Léa Pool*.

## TRICIA WASNEY

WINNIPEG



Tricia Wasney is Public Art Manager for the *Winnipeg Arts Council*. She has worked in Winnipeg's art community for many years in various roles of program manager, board

member, juror and artist/writer. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Film Studies and a Master of Landscape Architecture degree, both from the University of Manitoba. Prior to her current position she developed programming in film, literature, and the performing arts, as well as in visual art for online exhibitions, at the *Winnipeg Art Gallery*. She was hired by the *Winnipeg Arts Council* in 2002 to develop the public art policy that was ultimately adopted by *Winnipeg's City Council* in 2004. In 2004 she was appointed *Manager - Public Art* and now oversees a steadily growing public art program that includes art commissions, artist residencies and community-based projects.

Behind the walls of a once-grand East Hampton home, we meet Edith Bouvier Beale and her daughter, “Little Edie” – high society dropouts, reclusive cousins of Jackie O. — thriving together amid the decay and disorder of their ramshackle East Hampton mansion. A most intimate portrait of the unexpected, an eerie echo of the Kennedy Camelot, *Grey Gardens* has become a cult classic and established Little Edie as fashion icon and philosopher queen.

A landmark American documentary, *Salesman* captures in vivid detail the bygone era of the door-to-door salesman. While labouring to sell a gold-embossed version of the Good Book, Paul Brennan and his colleagues target the beleaguered masses—then face the demands of quotas and the frustrations of life on the road. Following Brennan on his daily rounds, the Maysles discover a real-life Willy Loman, walking the line from hype to despair.

In the late fifties and early sixties, smaller film cameras and portable recording devices revolutionized filmmaking. Technological advancement led to creative exploration and filmmakers broke from structured, scene-based documentary and brought cameras into real life. The NFB's Montreal-based French Unit was home to the Cinéma Direct movement in Canada, taking cameras into daily life in Quebec and influencing a generation of filmmakers. From lumberjacks to wrestlers to Montreal kids on skateboards, the films in this series share an intimacy with the subjects and an unflinching look at old ways and new worlds.



### MANOUANE RIVER LUMBERJACKS (LES BŪCHERONS DE LA MANOUANE)

From fall until spring, the Québec forests echo with the whine of power saws and the shouts of men in lumber camps. It is a tough, cold, and lonely job--the temperature may register -50 but the work continues. A rugged film about a rugged life, it takes you to the very heart of a major Canadian industry. Arthur Lamothe's first film is a classic of Québec documentary cinema. His portrait of Abitibi lumberjacks demystified the lifestyle for Canadians and entrenched the French Unit's perspective on film as a tool for social change.



### LA LUTTE

One of the early examples of direct cinema, *La Lutte* is a look at the world of professional wrestling as seen in the Montréal Forum, and in back-street wrestling parlors where the warriors practice their art. Nothing escapes the probing camera as well-muscled tyros grapple, punch, squirm, roar and grimace, adding their own variations of showmanship to amuse and excite the crowd.



### THE DEVIL'S TOY (ROULI-ROULANT)

This short 1966 documentary dedicated "to all victims of intolerance" depicts the dawn of skateboarding in Montreal. A new activity frowned upon by police and adults, skateboarding gave young kids the feeling of speed and freedom. This film - the first Canadian documentary ever made about the sport - captures the exuberance of boys and girls having the time of their lives in free-wheeling downhill locomotion.

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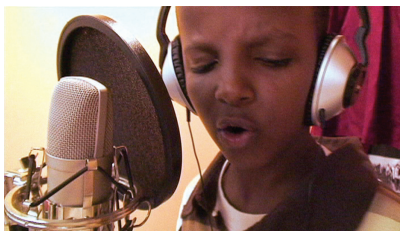

**LIFE FROM 95**

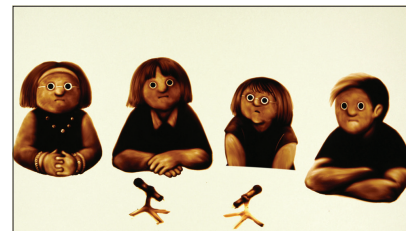
A poignant look at how music can provide hope to high risk refugee youth in the inner city. Jim Agapito and Ervin Chartrand document and create a music video with the youth of IRCOM (Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization of Manitoba) to deter them from gangs in the inner city. Utilizing funding and support from the WITH ART program which matches artists with community groups to collaborate on art projects that explore ideas and issues and give voice to community. The filmmakers worked with the youth of IRCOM to create a hip hop video and a documentary of the process. The resulting voices were literal, loud, clear and strong.



**JOHN AND MICHAEL**

Initiated through *Gimme Some Truth* in 2008, with the screening of the original *Chain Camera*, a feature documentary by Academy Award nominee Kirby Dick, and a workshop with Dick himself, the Spence Neighbourhood participants of the Winnipeg *Chain Camera* were provided video cameras to capture their lives through their own eyes. The result is telling and sometimes startling, taking audiences into the homes and personal lives of the youth of Winnipeg's Spence neighbourhood.

This anniversary inspired this documentary, which pays homage to Franco-Manitoban literature – to the words and those who wrote them – through a selection of extracted writings and interviews with the authors. *Le Blé at la plume* takes an impressionistic approach as a film, with distinctly toned sequences creating visually poetic moments and giving new dimensions to the words.

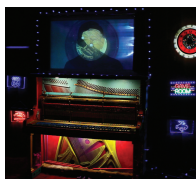

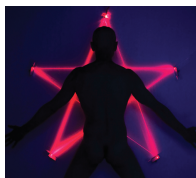

While it is widely known in independent filmmaking circles that documentary, including hybrid forms such as experimental and animated documentary, are the most marketable of any genre of short works, it can be frequently difficult for new and emerging filmmakers to understand the best markets to target for works in this genre. In this marketing case study, filmmaker Caroline Monnet will present three of her short documentaries - *IKWÉ*, *Warchild* and *Tashina* - and discuss the marketing opportunities that presented themselves for each of these works. Monica Lowe, Distribution Services Manager for the Winnipeg Film Group, which distributes several of Monnet's works, will discuss other types of opportunities for documentaries in general, including traditional and newer markets.
